The following checklist will help you gather information to create a vision for the trail or greenway project. For more detailed information about getting started, read "Secrets to Successful Rail-trails."

What type of corridor will the trail or greenway follow?

- Railroad corridor

Who owns the right-of-way?

- Railroad still in possession

What natural attributes does the corridor possess?

- Body of water (what type)
- Meadow
- Mountain

What does the corridor connect to?

- Towns (how many)
- Schools
- Public buildings, ie. library, government offices, etc.
- Museums/historical societies
- Hotels/B&B
- Neighborhoods
- Parks
- Retirement Homes

What interesting structures and history does the corridor have?

- Bridges
- Tunnels

What other interesting features does this corridor possess?

- Endangered species

Are there any features that make trail use or development difficult?

- Highways crossings
- Erosion
