






- Creates the "Active Transportation Investment Fund" (ATIF)
- Use of funds: paved pedestrian or paved nonmotorized trail projects
- 5% of annual TIF (road dollars) transferred into ATIF <u>annually</u>
- \$45M estimated in FY24



Trust for Public Land (TPL) is a national nonprofit that works to connect everyone to the benefits and joys of the outdoors. As a leader in equitable access to the outdoors, TPL works with communities to create parks and protect public land where it is needed most.

Since 1972, TPL has protected more than 3 million acres of public land, created more than 5,000 parks, trails, schoolyards, and iconic outdoor places, raised \$84 billion in public funding for parks and public lands, and connected more than 9 million people to the outdoors.

Billions for Trails and Active Transportation



RTC has worked to secure *\$10 billion* in state funding over the past 5 years, supported by Democrats and Republicans




Bipartisan support, funding in GOP-led states (FL, IN, NE, OH, UT), Dem-led states (CA, NY), & divided government states (NC, VA)



Significant increases in stateadministered, federal Transportation Alternatives funding

Case Study: Florida

- Sustained trail investments
 - SUN (Shared-Use Nonmotorized) Trail Networks and Florida Communities Trust
 - 2023: doubled SUN annual funding to \$50 million plus \$200 million one-time
 - State applying toll credits to support federal Transportation Alternatives (TA) projects




- Visionary Trails System
 - Bipartisan trails caucus
 - Invested \$60M ARPA in Next Level Trails Program
 - Additional \$30 million to Next Level Trails in 2023; total over five years: \$180 million
 - Maintenance & Agency Capacity
 - Gov. Eric J. Holcomb and State Rep. Carey Hamilton have each received RTC Rail-Trail Champion awards



Case Study: North Carolina

- Great Trails State Coalition
 - Planned, multi-year, incremental campaign
 - Year of the Trails bill, ~\$30 million funding (2022)
 - \$54 million in bipartisan funding (2023)
